



BLOCK OF THE MONTH

CELEBRATE CANADA'S 150th ANNIVERSARY WITH 150 PLACEMATS

This new project will be for the second part of our 2015-2016 SEASON, lasting for 5 months from January to May 2016. It will involve free instructional kits and regular demos at the guild meetings, with incentive prizes as well. The project's goal is to have a collection of at least 150 Canadian placemats for Outreach to distribute in 2017.



Before that happens, this collection of Canadian placemats will be on display at the Bell Homestead in June 2017 as part of the Brantford community's historical celebrations.

In this February newsletter, please find instructions for the traditional block Log Cabin which you can download. A FEW additional copies will be available at the membership table at the guild meeting. With this information in hand, we suggest you make a placemat using the log cabin block. The demonstration at the beginning of the guild meeting on February 11th will show you how to make a Valentine's Day placemat using a variation of the log cabin design. With a little Canadian Innukshuk motif, it could be very Canadian don't you think?

Our collection of placemats should reflect something CANADIAN and may be a SPECIFIC YEAR of Canada's history. Becky McAlister assigned years to many members and shared information about Canada's history year by year. Each month, she will add more historical tidbits in the CANADIAN HISTORICAL QUILT TRIVIA section of this newsletter. Can you think of a way to use a log cabin block in your placemat design of your chosen year? Have fun! ROSE MARIE'S 2016 NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION

The Guild has inspired me to add a New Year's resolution to my usual "exercise more, practice music more, get better organized" mantra. I want to join the ladies with fists full of "library bucks" who last year cleaned up on the bags of fabulous fabrics and quilting supplies at the annual auction! I'm starting late, but here is my plan:



First, I'll go into the library. Bingo! I will have one library buck to add to my pitifully small collection!

Inspired by the amnesty for over-due books, I will return the three library books which have been collecting dust on my shelf. (I am hopelessly behind in my reading, but have been loath to bring them back - hoping that some magical "time warp" will give me an opportunity to create beautiful quilts from each of them.) This could earn me 15 bucks.

The library rules say I can earn 20 bucks for completing a project from each book; nowhere do I see a requirement re the *size* of such a project. I figure I have time to make a small item (a pin cushion? a placemat?) from each, earning myself an additional 60 bucks! And finally,

I will write a brief review to earn an additional 30 library bucks. I can already see myself bidding for sewing supplies and fat quarters in June!

NINE BY NINE - 9-PATCH Quilts, 9 WAYS - Cyndi Hershey

This book is great for a novice quilter like myself. The first chapters deal with basics such as fabric selection and construction technique. Subsequent chapters offer a variety of quilt patterns based on the 9-patch design, together with detailed instructions. I used the 9-patch method for a pin cushion, but the Sudoku Sampler is definitely on my bucket list of quilting goals!

SKINNY QUILTS & table runners II - edited by Eleanor Levie

Distinctly different designs are offered in this book, featuring the work of 15 celebrated quilters. Designs range from patchwork in the traditional "Rhubarb Crisp" or geometric "Rungs", attainable by less experienced quilters, to one-of-a-kind art work of "Cut Flowers" or "Waking Up, down the shore". (I will leave these ones to the "pros".) Easy to follow instructions and detailed illustrations are included for each design.


<u>UNDERGROUND RAILROAD SAMPLER</u> - Eleanor Burns & Sue Bouchard

Historians in the readership will know that as many as 100,000 people escaped slavery between the American Revolution and the Civil War via the Underground Railroad, many arriving to safety in Canada. Blocks in this sampler quilt represent signals used along the route, and the author includes a brief explanation of each, together with a suggested skill level and detailed instructions. Quilts made from single designs are illustrated as well as samplers in various sizes. I'm a big fan of the sampler style of quilt - I will either be borrowing this book again or purchasing a copy myself when I'm ready to start another major project.

WHY PEOPLE JOIN QUILT GUILDS

Quilting guilds are packed with people who are cut from the same cloth, sharing the same passion for fabric, sewing, colour, and beauty. You will likely discover an array of aesthetics and skill levels among the group—not to mention a veritable patchwork quilt of personalities!—and it's all part of the fun. The common thread lies in the eagerness to share stories about quiltmaking. And we promise, this gang *will* understand all the hard work you put into a project!

BHQG BLOCK OF THE MONTH - - LOG CABIN FEBRUARY 2016

This month's block is the traditional log cabin. It is an easy pattern with lots of versatility in design. Traditionally, it is made in lights and darks, representing the sunny side and the shady side of the house with a red square in the middle for the hearth.

In these instructions, the block is done in blues for the dark side, yellows for the light side and red in the middle. The pattern uses fabric strips of 2 in wide.



Fabric Requirements

You will need fabric strips in a variety of darks and lights. This is a good way to use up your stash. If you like, use only 2 colours like these instructions. Darks and lights. Colour A or darks (blues) total about 60 inches of 2 in. strips.

Colour B or lights (yellows) total about 45 inches of 2 in. strips.

The middle square of red is 2 in. x 2 in.

If you are using short scrappy strips, there may be more waste.

You have been provided with a red strip of fabric. Cut your red square and save the leftover to use whenever you wish in another month. The idea is to make both sides of the house in contrast to each other.

Cutting

As you cut strips arrange them as in photo

 Red
 - 2 in. square
 Yellow - 8 in.

 Blue
 - 2 in. square
 Blue
 - 8 in.

 Blue
 - 3.5 in.
 Blue
 - 9.5 in.

 Yellow - 5 in.
 Yellow - 9.5 in.

 Yellow - 11 in.
 Yellow - 11 in.

 Blue
 - 5 in.
 Blue
 - 11 in.

 Blue
 - 6.5 in.
 Blue
 - 12.5 in.

Yellow - 6.5 in.

Instructions - Use 1/4 in. seam allowance. The 1/4 in. specialty quilting foot is strongly recommended.

- 1. Sew red and blue square right sides together. Press seam away from the center.
- 2. Sew 3.5 in. Blue along the long side of the rectangle. Always use pins at each end of the strip.



3. Refer to all the following photos and see how the log cabin is assembled.

The strips are added in a rotating manner adding the longer strips.

- 4. Refer to photo on left. First sew the 3.5 in. strip of Yellow.
- 5. Then add the 5 in. strip of Yellow.



- 6. Continue adding in a rotating manner. Sew the 5 in. strip of Blue.
- 7. Next sew 6.5 in. strip of Blue.
- 8. Trim the unit to make 6.5in square.



- 9. Continue adding in a rotating manner. Sew the 6.5 in. strip of Yellow.and then sew the 8 in. strip of Yellow.
- 10. Next sew the 8 in. strip of Blue and then sew the 9.5 in. strip of Blue.



- 11. Continue adding in a rotating manner. Sew the 9.5 in. strip of Yellow and then sew the 11 in. strip of Yellow.
- 12. Next sew the 11 in. strip of Blue and then sew the 12.5 in. strip of Blue.
- 13. Finally, trim the block to make a 12.5 in square.
