

Judy: a board for her rulers that her husband made for her

Janice: a light on a board with a glass section (for tracing her appliqué pieces). She also uses a wooden paper presser that her husband

made for her.

Linda: an ironing board that Keith made for her measuring 18" by 16" and 1 ½ inch plywood. He even used a keyboard stand with brackets to affix the board to it.

Cathy: She purchased a kitchen island from Home Depot. She uses it with her cutting board and raises the leaf for more space. Of course the extra shelves are for extra storage.

Joan: She treasures a basket that her kids made for her to carry her appliqué.

Roseline: Her display wall that she made out of insulation board from Home Depot. They cut the boards to 6 ft. She then used wide masking tape to butt them together, cover the two boards with batting, then put a wide back fabric on the front. These boards lean against one wall.

- An alternative drop off point will be announced in the November newsletter.



Turnpike Style Quilt

Reference: Jenny Doan from the Missouri Star Quilt Company (Youtube Video)

Fabric Requirements:

1 Layer Cake of prints (40 10-inch squares) 1 m. of matching background 1 Layer Cake of a background colour (40)2 m. for outer border and binding

Instructions

- 1. Place 2 10-inch squares, 1 print, 1 background, right sides together.
- 2. Sew a quarter-inch seam down each side, but not top and bottom.
- 3. Cut once diagonally from corner to corner.
- 4. Press to the dark side.
- 5. Sew triangles together to form an hour-glass block.
- 6. Square up to 13 inches square.
- 7. Cut a strip 3 inches wide from each side and the top and bottom.

8. Rotate hour-glass block so that background rectangles are beside print and background triangles are beside print rectangles.

- 9. Similarly, rotate corner half-square triangles so that print halves are beside
- background rectangles and background halves are beside print rectangles.

10. Sew blocks in a grid 6 blocks by 6 blocks, making sure to alternate print rectangles on the side with background rectangles on the side.

11. Complete pinwheels by cutting 24 rectangles that are 7 1/2 inches by 3 inches.

12. Construct 48 half square triangles using the following method. Use three of the

remaining 10-inch printed squares and three of the background squares. Cut each

square into four 5-inch squares so that you have 12 print squares and 12 background squares. (each 5 inches)

13. Place one print square on top of a background square, right sides together and sew a quarter-inch seam on all four sides Cut two diagonals from corner to corner. This will result in 4 (3-inch) half square triangles. (a total of 48)

- 14. Sew a half square triangle to each end of the background 7 1/2 by 3 inch rectangle to make 24 strips.
- 15. You will need to add 4 more 3-inch half square triangles in each corner of the quilt.
- 16. Add a desired width border.

Turn Style Quilt (89" × 89" with 6" border.)

Fabric Requirements:

1 Layer Cake of prints (40 10- inch squares)


1 Layer Cake of a background colour (40)


1 m. of matching background

2 m. for outer border and binding.

Instructions:

- 1. Place 2 10-inch squares, 1 print, 1 background, right sides together.
- Sew a quarter-inch seam down each side, but not top and bottom.
- 3. Cut once diagonally from corner to corner. Fig. I
- 4. Press to the dark side.
- Sew triangles together to form an hourglass block.
- 6. Square up to 13 inches square.
- Cut a strip 3 inches wide from each side and the top and bottom. Fig. 2
- Rotate hour-glass block so that background rectangles are beside print and background triangles are beside print rectangles.
- Similarly, rotate corner half-square triangles so that print halves are beside background rectangles and background halves are beside print rectangles. Se
- 10. Sew blocks in a grid 6 blocks by 6 blocks, making sure to alternate print rectangles on the side with background rectangles on the side.
- 11. Complete pinwheels by cutting 24 rectangles that are $7\frac{1}{2}$ inches by 3 inches.






Rotate centre Square 90°. Rotate corner HSTs. Sew as pictured.

Pg 2 TURN PIKE INSTRUCTIONS

- 12. Construct 48 half square triangles using the following method. Use three of the remaining 10-inch printed squares and three of the background squares. Cut each square into four 5-inch squares so that you have 12 print squares and 12 background squares. (each 5 inches)
- 13. Place one print square on top of a background square, right sides together and sew a quarter-inch seam on all four sides Cut two diagonals from corner to corner. This will result in 4 3-inch half square triangles. (a total of 48) Fig. 5
- 14. Sew a half square triangle to each end of the background $7\frac{1}{2}$ by 3 inch rectangle to make 24 strips. Fig.b
- 15. You will need to add 4 more 3-inch half square triangles in each corner of the quilt.
- 16. Add a desired-width border.

BHQG Christmas Cookie Recipe Share

CHEWY CHOCOLATE CREAM CHEESE COOKIES

- 1 package cream cheese
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 egg
- 1 1/2 cup white sugar
- 2 1/4 cup flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 cup chocolate chips

Beat cream cheese, butter, egg and sugar until fluffy. Melt 1 cup chocolate chips, stir into batter. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 - 12 minutes. ENJOY

Empire Cookies submitted by Barb Minutello

2 1/2 cups flour 1tsp. baking soda 1 tsp. cream of tartar 1/4 tsp. salt 1 cup butter 1 1/2 cups sifted icing sugar 1 egg 1 tsp. vanilla Candied cherries Icing 2 cups icing sugar 1 tsp. Almond or peppermint extract Milk





In bowl of mixer, beat butter until creamy. Add icing sugar gradually, beating all the time. Continue beating til light and fluffy. Add egg and vanilla and beat a little more. Stir in dry ingredients. Chill dough about 1/2 an hour then roll out on floured surface about 1/4 " thick. Cut out with a round 3" cookie cutter (you can use a smaller one if you prefer). Bake on an ungreased cookie sheet at 350 for about 6-8 minutes just til edges are slightly golden. Cookies will look quite white. Let cool then sandwich two together with a tsp. raspberry jam in the middle.

Mix together about 2 cups icing sugar, 1 tsp. Almond or peppermint extract and enough milk to make it slightly runny. Spread icing on top of cookies and top with a candied cherry.

Sift together flour, baking soda, cream of tartar and salt. Set aside.



Candy/Gift Baskets

Let's get ready for Christmas. Make a candy dish/basket for family and friends. (compliments of Heart'n Home Creations)

	Small Basket 5" long x 2"wide x 2 1/2"tall	Large Basket 6" long × 4"wide × 4"tall
Outside	cut 1 - 7" x 9 1/2" **if directional fabric - cut 2 - 5" x 7" cut 2 - 1 1/2" x 5" handles	cut 1 - 8" x 11 1/2" **if directional fabric - cut 2 - 6" x 8" cut 2 - 1 1/2" x 5" handles
Lining	as above excluding the handles	as above excluding the handles
Interfacing	as above excluding the handles	as above excluding the handles





* labels are optional - use muslin scraps

Instructions: stitch all seams with 1/4" seam allowance.

1. Press the interfacing to the wrong sides of the outside fabric.

If your piece was cut 7" x 9 1/2", fold the piece in half right sides together to

measure 7" across and 4 1/2" high. Stitch down each 4 1/2" side.

If your fabric was directional, place the two pieces right side together. Stitch along each side and across the bottom.

Repeat for the lining pieces.

2. Stitch the corners to form the bottom: Fold each stitched basket in half lining up the side and bottom seam or center of the bottom. Measure 1 1/2" from the corner, draw a line and stitch on the line. Trim the excess to leave 1/4" seam allowance. Repeat for each corner of the outside and lining of the baskets.


3. Fold each handle in half to measure 3/4" x 5". Turn right side out and press. Position on the right side of the basket, turn the ends under and stitch a small square on the end of each handle to attach it to the basket.


4. Place the outside and lining baskets right sides together. Stitch around the top edge of the basket leaving a 2" opening. Turn right side out and press. Topstitch around the top of the basket.

Follow the same directions for the large basket but substitute the larger pieces.

WHY WE CELEBRATE REMEMBRANCE DAY

Remembrance Day is a memorial day observed by Canadians and other members of the Commonwealth since the end of the First World War in order to remember all those who fought and died in the line of duty to keep us free. Every year on November 11, Canadians pause in a moment of silence to honour and remember more than 2 million Canadians who have served, and continue to serve, Canada during times of war, conflict, and peace. If we do not remember, their sacrifice is meaningless.

Remembrance Day was first observed in 1919 throughout the British Commonwealth and was originally called Armistice Day to commemorate the armistice agreement that ended the First World War on Monday, November 11, 1918, at 11:00 am. Until 1930, Armistice Day was held on the Mon-

day of the week in which November 11 fell. In 1931 a bill was introduced to observe Armistice Day only on November 11, and to change its name to Remembrance Day. The first Remembrance Day was observed on November 11, 1931.

Every November 11th, the official Canadian national ceremonies are held at the National War Memorial in Ottawa according to a strict protocol with the Governor General presiding over the ceremony. A service is held and armed services representatives lay wreaths. Church services are held across Canada, which often include the playing of "The Last Post", a reading of "In Flanders Fields" by John McCrae, and two minutes of silence at 11:00.


